

Clues shouldn't be too obvious, as the reader shouldn't be able to solve the mystery early on, before the big reveal.

In The Titanic Detective Agency, the main character, 12-year-old Bertha Watt, is determined to solve the mystery of the mysterious widower, Mr Louis Hoffman. Convinced that Mr Hoffman is up to no good, Bertha sets up The Titanic Detective Agency with the help of her new friend, Madge Collyer.

The best part of writing this particular mystery story is that it was based on real events, and all the characters were real-life passengers and crew on the doomed ship. I had to do a lot of research to ensure all the details were accurate, but Titanic is such a fascinating subject that I thoroughly enjoyed the research.

I've just finished the 2nd draft of a children's adventure story set on the Ayrshire coast, about merfolk and a monster! And I've completed the first draft of a story called The Rewilders, featuring lynx, wolves, and two children on a strange quest in the Highlands. Hopefully, one or both will be published next year so I would love you to look out for them and read them!



What the ladybird heard at the seaside by Julia Donaldson


Aimed at Reception & Year 1
